Croston Remembers Project



Last year, to mark the 100th Anniversary of the end of WWI, posts were placed outside the homes of the 36 Croston men who lost their lives. This year marks the 80th Anniversary of the start of WWII, in which Croston lost a further 12 men.

Small plaques (8 x 15cm) are to be made which, with the house owner's consent, can be fixed to the house to provide a permanent reminder of the sacrifice of all 48 men.

Croston Remembers US Pilot Kenneth V Burnett

In addition to the Croston Remembers plaques, the village wishes to remember the US Pilot Kenneth V Burnett, aged 22, who was killed when his P-38 plane crashed down Meadow Lane in January 1943. The Parish Council has agreed for a plaque to be placed on the wall of our War Memorial in his memory.



Subject to Lancashire County Council's agreement, it is hoped that a stone could be placed in Meadow Lane, close to where the accident happened. The cost of this has been offered by a resident who was eight years old at the time, and remembers being taken to look where it happened.

Kath Almond has been in touch with Lieutenant Kenneth Burnett's relative in Kansas, and will keep her informed of developments.

Lower Yarrow Flood Action Group Croston Dam in use

The Croston Flood Risk Management Scheme, now referred to by the Environment Agency as the Croston Dam, was used "in anger" for the first time over the weekend 28/29 September. Following heavy rainfall the river level at Castle Bridge rose to the Dam's first "trigger "point at around midday on the Saturday and the Dam continued in use, we believe, until the following Monday evening. Happily no homes were flooded and, as such, the Dam clearly operated successfully and achieved its stated objective.

However, although no homes were flooded, - a great achievement in itself - we believe the river rose higher than the EA's designers expected and as a result gardens and some out buildings including the Sports Club's Tennis Pavilion were flooded.

And there was a good deal of disruption caused by flooded roads, particularly in Carvers Brow. (continued on facing page)

And further we believe that flooding was avoided in homes in parts of Grape Lane and Church Street because the Croston Pump, situated behind the Old School, worked effectively throughout, being assisted by a pump operated by the Fire Service at the most critical time on the Sunday afternoon. We are most grateful to the Fire Service for this help.

As a way of reducing this flooding in future flood events, we have asked the Environment Agency to consider lowering the trigger points at which the Dam is brought into use. The downside of such a change would be that more of the Dam's capacity to impound water would be used up but our view is that there is scope to do this as the Dam's maximum capacity was never remotely approached over this weekend.

For its part the EA has told us that they are in the process of reviewing all that happened over this weekend with the Dam's control software designers. So we wait patiently for the outcome of that review.

Britian in Bloom North West Judges Report 2019

We have now received the judges report - 92 points scored out of 100!

The judging is split into 3 categories with marks awarded in each section.

Horticulture: 36 points (max 40)

Judges commented on the additional planters they saw and noted that the "Doorstep Challenge" and the "Greening Croston" campaign which was supported by Croston Together had been very successful. They noted very good floral displays at pubs, businesses and Croston Sports Club. The Station was described as outstanding. Mr McGregor's Garden, all knitted and crocheted by the Croston Knitwits, received a special mention.



Environment: 29 points (max 30)

The judges wrote of the excellent Heritage Trail and the conservation work at Bishop Chester's wood and nature reserve.

They found the village "extremely clean, tidy and free from litter" and were very impressed by the water conservation system which has been used on the Recreation Park.

Community: 27 points (Max 30)

Another excellent score with the support from organisations businesses being noted. "Wonderful effort by all concerned"

The Judges concluded with "All the very best for 2020 - you are a credit to North West in Bloom - on behalf of the committee thank you for your tremendous entry. "





Work over the winter months

Our work does not stop!

We have planted 300 rockery Tulip bulbs in the planters on the river walls which have been also been planted with Bellis daisies.

The Parish Council's contractor has also planted bulbs and Primulas in all the other planters which the bloom group will now keep an eye on over the winter months.

We will also be continuing our work on the Out Lane car park where we will shortly be planting fruit trees to create a community orchard. Thanks go to Croston WI and Amanda Nicholson for sponsoring this project.

The board will contain information relating to Croston - it's history, landmarks, charter etc. and will replace the current Charter and garden.

The Central Lancashire Authorities of Preston City, South Ribble and Chorley are undertaking a review of the development plan(s) for the area and are working towards the preparation of a Joint Local Plan for Central Lancashire. This will be a



single Planning document containing the Council's vision and objectives. It will set strategic and local development management policies and site allocations for future development across the three authorities. Once adopted, the Local Plan will guide the future growth and development in the Central Lancashire area and replace the Central Lancashire Core Strategy (adopted in 2012) and the Local Plans/Site Allocations and Development Management Policies of the 3 Central Lancashire Authorities (all adopted 2015).

We are now consulting on the first document to be prepared which will help to shape the policies developed in the Local Plan. The **'Central Lancashire Local Plan Issues and Options Consultation'** is in the form of an online survey, which asks you to give us your opinions on the key issues facing Central Lancashire and presents all of the submitted site options for the region (made-up both of sites received through previous Call for Sites consultations in 2018/19 and sites added by the local authorities of Preston, Chorley and South Ribble).

We're also launching Part 3 of our Call for Sites consultation to give residents and stakeholders the opportunity to submit more smaller housing sites of up to five dwellings as well employment sites (especially brownfield), both of which were few in number during the previous consultations and both of which are integral to ensuring a robust and future proof Local Plan for Central Lancashire, one that provides sufficient places for residents to work and live.

recycle clean plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays at home

We are making it easier for you recycle more plastic waste. Along with plastic bottles, which are already collected, residents will be able to put **clean plastic pots, tubs and trays** in your recycling bins at home.

These include yoghurt pots, margarine tubs, and meat, fruit and vegetable trays of any shape or colour, along with their lids. It is easy to see whether something is recyclable by checking the number stamped onto it. Anything with a number 1, 2 or 5 within the recycling triangle should go into your blue recycling bin.

The colour and shape of the container doesn't matter - the main thing is to check that that it can be recycled, and give it a rinse. If the plastic still has food waste on it, or is covered in plastic film, it can cause a problem as in the recycling system and could end up not be recycled at all.
